#### Hallam, How Are We Doing?



The survey was open from 12 April to 9 May 2021. The survey was split into two sections:

- Teaching & learning this data formed a bit part of 2020/21 Student Voice Report
- Membership questions this data will form our future internal data dashboard and questions were developed with KPI's in mind

A total of 1463 student responded to the survey (approximately 4% of the student body), though not every student responded to each question.

This presentation includes only the results from the section on teaching & learning.














# Thinking of your learning and course experience this academic year as a whole, what is one thing that could have been improved?



#### The top 3 themes were:

- Virtual learning issues some students not feeling like they are getting the full
  university experience, feeling unsupported in navigating their VLE, feeling
  unmotivated to take part in asynchronous learning, or other technical issues (internet
  issues, zoom waiting rooms, etc)
- Communication within the course feelings of isolation, not feeling connected to their lecturers/academic staff, but also uneven distribution of materials via VLE or with information on assessment
- Teaching & learning issues issues with group work, especially when virtual (i.e. virtual break out rooms); issues of students on practical/vocational courses concerned about their course content being applicable in real world application; upskilling staff and students reactive approach to teaching virtually; lack of engaging teaching methods used virtually
